#### Truth in Lending Act


- Created by the federal government
- Protects consumers with credit transactions





#### Truth in Savings Act

- Created by the federal government
- Protects consumers with opening a savings account





#### FDIC

- Stands for the Federal Deposit Insurance
  Corporation
- Part of the federal government
- Protects money deposited in FDIC-insured institutions



What are examples of personal information not to share with others?

- Date of birth
- Address
- Social security number
- Driver's license
- Passwords





What are possible consequences of sharing your personal information?

- Your identity could be stolen
- You could lose money.
- You could be charged with a crime if someone stole your identity and then committed a crime.





What are ways to protect our stuff and our identity?

- Find a safe place to keep our money.
- Find a safe place to keep our valuables, such as cell phones and MP3 players.
- Find a safe way to store our identity information, such as our date of birth, our address, a driver's license, a social security number, or a password.
